Rising 1st Graders - Summer Learning

As you prepare your child to enter 1st grade, we've put together a list of skills that are important to practice over the summer months to ensure a smooth transition. We have provided suggestions that make learning fun and active along with resources that can help you with other ideas.

SKILLS TO PRACTICE

- Letter Identification
 - Write letters with sidewalk chalk & have child run to letter you call out
- Letter Sounds
 - Play "I Spy" I spy something that starts with the letter ____
 - Cut out pictures from magazines/newspapers that start with certain letter
- Basic Sentence Structure
 - Practice writing complete sentences with a capital letter and appropriate punctuation
- Fluency
 - Ask your child to read aloud to you. Be sure they're using appropriate pacing (pausing at commas and end of sentences), using appropriate inflection (excited tone when they see an exclamation point), and reading smoothly.
- Rhyming Words
 - Recite nursery rhymes and discuss the words that rhyme
 - Cut out pictures of objects that rhyme
 - Read rhyming books together (Dr. Seuss, Llama Llama, etc.)
- Comprehension
 - While reading with your child, ask a variety of questions about the text and discuss the story.
 - Do you like this book? Why?
 - What is your favorite part? Why?
 - Who was your favorite character? What did he/she do?
 - Can you tell me the story in your own words?

Kindergarten Sight Words - Sight words are memorized so that a child can recognize commonly used or phonetically irregular words at a glance, without needing to go letter-by-letter. Kindergarten students should enter 1st grade being able to read these words. Once these are mastered, we suggest working on the Fry Sight Word lists. You can make your own flashcards to practice by using blank index cards.
