Dickson County Board of Education

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The Dickson County School Board desires that all students develop a strong sense of personal and social responsibility. Development of this virtue can occur by infusing service-learning* (SL) instructional formats as an integral component of the curriculum. Research demonstrates that SL can help students develop transferable skills, increase career exploration, and improve confidence as well as strengthen academic outcomes and civic education. These opportunities help students recognize the relevance of what they are learning in school and can be designed to help develop cross-cultural relationships with the community.

The Board affirms the importance of SL as a vital part of the instructional program and endorses the use of state recognized SL models as a teaching methodology that can and should be used by teachers to support student achievement through service to the community. Further, the Board recognizes that SL is an effective vehicle to reinforce specific academic content areas in the classroom, and that many of our district learner objectives and benchmarks can be reached through SL. To that end, staffs are encouraged to collaborate with local public and non-profit agencies such as University of Tennessee Extension in order to develop service learning activities that meet educational objectives and also support current community efforts to meet health, environmental, or public safety needs. The Board urges all building administrators to participate in training opportunities on SL methods and provide leadership for SL coordination. Further, the Board encourages principals to include SL in each building's staff development plan.

Parents/guardians shall receive information about the community service learning opportunities offered by the District and their benefits for both the community and the student. The District shall ask parents/ guardians to acknowledge this information before students participate in off-campus service activities.

A long-term plan to implement SL, in the district as an instructional strategy will be developed. The Tennessee State Board of Education has encouraged local boards to implement SL requirements for a capstone project. The SL capstone project will not be a requirement for graduation but will be encouraged. Those students accumulating a minimum of 40 hours of service learning experience by April 30th of their senior year will earn a Diploma of Distinction and will be recognized during their graduation ceremony. An official notation will also be included on student permanent records as a way to allow students the opportunity to be noticed by colleges and universities as having gone above and beyond in terms of citizenship to the school and larger community.

*High quality SL is defined as an innovative strategy in which students apply curriculum skills to community service and includes :Identifying and meeting a real community need, integration and enhancement of the standards-based curriculum, coordination with the larger community, the fostering of civic responsibility, and a structured time for reflection.
